Federal Update for Connect Transit Prepared by Cardinal Infrastructure June 22, 2021 Board of Trustees Meeting Prepared June 15, 2021

INVEST Act 2.0

On June 4, 2021, the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee released its Investing in a New Vision for the Environment and Surface Transportation (INVEST) in America Act. This bill is a five-year, \$547 billion surface transportation proposal, increasing spending levels by 11% to meet the investment goals of the President's American Jobs Plan. The bill was marked up by the Committee and could go to the House floor the week of June 28th.

It is unlikely the Senate Banking Committee (with jurisdiction over the transit title) will meet the ambitious proposal laid out by House Chairman DeFazio (D-OR), and a concrete strategy has yet to unfold on passing the respective bills (whether through regular order or partly through budget reconciliation), reconciling the differences, and getting it to the President's desk for signature. There is still have a long way to go in terms of the legislative drafting and congressional consideration process, as well as a defined "pay-for" for the surface transportation bill, and whether it will be included in a comprehensive infrastructure package.

Amended and new provisions in the bill include, but are not limited to:

- Expands the Innovation Workforce Standards provision to include mobility on demand services in addition to automated vehicle transit.
- Requires regulations be established to "repurpose, recycle, reuse, sell, or lease transit vehicle batteries
 that are beyond the useful service life of such batteries for the purpose of transit vehicle propulsion and
 component parts of such batteries."
- Establishes a \$1 billion All Stations Accessibility Program "to assist eligible entities in financing capital projects to upgrade accessibility for persons with disabilities..."
- Establishes the Reconnecting Neighborhoods Program, "to identify, remove, replace, retrofit, or remediate the effects from eligible facilities and restore or improve connectivity, mobility, and access in disadvantaged and underserved communities…"
- Establishes the Reduce Transit Deserts Program "to establish or enhance bus service with headways equal to or shorter than 20 minutes for at least 18 hours per day in neighborhoods lacking such service; or to establish or increase express lane transit service that connects communities to jobs and essential destinations…"
- Establishes set-asides for "low income communit[ies]" and "priority area[s]" under the Zero Emission Bus Grants Program.
- Requires that not less that 12.5 percent of funds under the Zero Emission Bus Grants Program be available for workforce development training.
- Applies apprenticeship utilization requirements on select grant programs.

Senate EPW Reauthorization

The Senate Environment and Public Works (EPW) Committee released and marked up a bipartisan \$303.5 billion (34% above the FAST Act funding level) surface transportation reauthorization bill.

- Increases the Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Transportation Alternatives Program set-aside.
- STBG funding eligibility is amended to include construction of wildlife crossing structures, electric vehicle charging and vehicle-to-grid infrastructure, intelligent transportation technologies, projects that facilitate intermodal connections between emerging transportation technologies, resilience features, etc.

- Expands Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) activities to include bikesharing, shared scooter systems, purchase of medium- or heavy-duty zero emission vehicles and related charging equipment.
- Codified and expands the Safe Routes to School Program through 12th grade.
- Allows FHWA discretionary funding greater than \$5 million "to be expended after grant selection but prior to the grant agreement being signed, and for such funds to be credited toward the non-Federal cost share of the project."
- Establishes a Bridge Investment Program "to improve the safety, efficiency, and reliability of the movement of people and freight over bridges."
- Establishes new grant programs for charging and fueling infrastructure "to strategically deploy publicly accessible electric vehicle charging infrastructure, hydrogen fueling infrastructure, propane fueling infrastructure, and natural gas fueling infrastructure along designated alternative fuel corridors or in certain other locations that will be accessible..."
- Establishes a carbon reduction program to reduce transportation emissions; eligible projects include a public transportation project eligible for federal highway assistance, among other projects.
- Establishes a Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient, and Cost-saving Transportation (PROTECT) grant program, comprised of both formula and discretionary funds, to improve the resiliency of transportation infrastructure.
- Establishes the Healthy Streets grant program to improve air quality, reduce impervious surfaces, storm water runoff and flood risks, and heat impacts to infrastructure and road users.
- Establishes the Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program to study the feasibility and impacts of
 removing, retrofitting, or mitigating an existing transportation facility that create barriers to
 mobility, access, or economic development, and for construction funds to carry out a project to remove,
 retrofit or mitigate an eligible facility and, if appropriate, to replace it with a new facility.
- Codifies One Federal Decision; limiting the time required for environmental reviews and authorizations
 for major infrastructure projects to two years; limits environmental documents to 200 pages unless a
 review is of unusual scope and complexity.

Senate Commerce reauthorization bill

The Senate Commerce, Science, and Transportation Committee released its bipartisan Surface Transportation Investment Act - the Committee's rail, freight, and safety title of the surface transportation reauthorization bill.

The Act provides \$78 billion over a five-year period, of which, over \$25 billion is dedicated to passenger rail, \$7.5 billion is for rail safety and improvement projects, and \$6 billion for NHTSA's highway safety programs, among other provisions.

Notably, the bill includes:

- \$1.5 billion per year for the Local and Regional Project Assistance Program (i.e., RAISE grant program).
- \$10 billion over five years for a newly created National Infrastructure Project Assistance Program for highway or bridge projects, railway-highway grade separation or elimination projects, and public transportation projects.
- \$1.2 billion per year for the Nationally Significant Freight and Highway Projects Program (i.e., INFRA).
- \$100 million per year for the Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation Grant Program; public transit agencies, MPOS, state and local governments are eligible to conduct demonstration projects focused on advanced smart city or community technologies and systems to improve transportation efficiency and safety.
- Establishes an Electric Vehicle Working Group to provide federal guidance and strategy for the development, adoption, and integration of electric vehicles.
- Requires the revision of the National Travel and Tourism Infrastructure Strategic Plan to consider the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

- Establish the Advanced Research Projects Agency-Infrastructure (ARPA-I) to fund research and development on advanced transportation infrastructure technologies.
- Establishes the Safe Streets and Roads for All Program; MPOs and local governments are eligible for projects that support initiatives to prevent death and serious injury on roads and streets (i.e., "Vision Zero" or "Toward Zero Deaths" initiatives).
- Requires vehicle-to-pedestrian research to ensure bicyclists and other vulnerable road users will be incorporated into the safe deployment of connected vehicle systems.

President's Budget Request

The President released a \$6 trillion FY 2022 Budget Request to Congress. The request includes the President's \$2.3 trillion American Jobs Plan, \$1.8 trillion American Families Plan, and \$1.5 trillion in discretionary spending.

The U.S. DOT Budget Highlights document states:

"Since Congress is now considering multi-year legislation that would begin in FY 2022, the budget displays flat levels equal to the last year of the FAST Act for simplicity. This is not a policy decision that the next reauthorization should equal FAST ACT levels, but rather a technical presentation to ensure consistency between the American Jobs Plan and the traditional DOT accounts...The \$621 billion in [transportation] investments proposed in the American Jobs Plan represent investments in addition to the base amounts included in the FY 2022 President's Budget request."

The President's Budget Request includes:

- \$50 million Integrated Smart Mobility Program; fund up to five pilot projects to support transit agencies in adopting innovative approaches to mobility.
- \$250 million Zero Emission System Transformation Grants; competitive grants for the purchase of approximately 265 new zero emission buses and associated infrastructure.
- \$15 million New Mobility Trends Research; undertake demonstration projects to study route optimization strategies to better match demand and supply; integration of public transportation with other non-transit mobility options; first and last mile innovations.
- \$10 million Research to Accelerate Adoption of Zero Emission Buses; including the analysis of vehicle specifications and development of operational, charging, and related infrastructure requirements.
- \$5 million Safety Innovations Research: research and demonstration projects to identify, develop, demonstrate, and deploy the systems, processes, and technologies necessary for public transportation to remain the safest mode of transportation per passenger.
- \$2.473 billion Capital Investment Grants
- \$200 million Transit Modernization Sprint Program; competitive grants to reduce the transit state-of-good-repair backlog and accelerate equitable economic growth and competitiveness.
- \$50 million Climate Resilience and Adaptation Program competitive grants to improve the resilience of transit assets to climate related hazards.

Transportation and Housing Hearing

The Senate Banking Committee held a hearing on "21st Century Communities: Expanding Opportunity Through Infrastructure Investments." Witnesses included Transportation Secretary Buttigieg and Housing and Urban Development Secretary Fudge.

In Chairman Brown's (D-OH) opening remarks, he said, "President Biden and I also agree on the need to replace aging transit buses with zero-emissions vehicles made right here in America...We're going to build new buses and rail cars and homes in America, with American raw materials and American union workers."

Ranking Member Toomey (R-PA), in opening remarks, while referencing COVID relief funding for public transit and later mentioning "efforts to increase wasteful government spending," said, "Democrats tried to justify this spending by saying that transit systems would collapse from declines in ridership and state and local government revenues. But ridership did not drop to zero and has improved."

In Secretary Buttigieg's opening testimony, alongside endorsing transportation investments under the American Jobs Plan, he said, "...transit-oriented development and public transit is such a priority for our department and for me personally."

Secretary Fudge, in opening remarks, said, "HUD and [DOT] are committed to working with one another to help communities build more sustainable infrastructure—and expand access to both affordable housing and affordable options for transportation."

Senator Moran (R-KS) asked Secretary Buttigieg about renewable natural gas vehicles being competitive under discretionary grant programs, particularly the Low or No Emission Vehicle grant program. Moran asked the Secretary to permit agencies to consider the "cleanest available vehicles that suit the needs of the fleet and the public transit infrastructure." Secretary said with a program "designed to minimize emissions, a vehicle with zero tailpipe emissions will typically be more competitive."

Senator Cortez Masto (D-NV) discussed her Moving and Fostering Innovation to Revolutionize Smarter Transportation (Moving FIRST) Act and the importance of "embracing advanced technologies for cities," as well as the Better Planning and Land-Use for Accessible Neighborhoods (PLAN) Act to "create more affordable housing and better integrate transportation."

Senator Smith (D-MN) discussed the importance of infrastructure investment benefits reaching lower income or disadvantaged communities. Secretary Buttigieg responded by referencing strong labor agreements and local hiring preferences.

Senate Finance Hearing

The Senate Finance Committee held a hearing on "Funding and Financing Options to Bolster American Infrastructure." Witnesses included:

- Joseph Kile, Director of Microeconomic Analysis, Congressional Budget Office
- Victoria Sheehan, President, American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials
- Shirley Bloomfield, CEO of NTCA The Rural Broadband Association
- Heather Buch, Chair, National Association of Counties (NACo) Transportation Steering Committee

Chairman Wyden (D-OR) promoted "mega-corporations" paying to support the infrastructure proposal and leveraging private sector participation and spoke against leaning on user-fees to pay for infrastructure.

Ranking Member Crapo (R-ID) was clear in his opening statement on where Republicans stand on paying for the infrastructure bill, saying, "Consideration of offsetting the cost of infrastructure with a corporate tax rate increase... is counterproductive and a non-starter on my side of the aisle." He further endorsed utilizing userfees, including for electric vehicles (EVs), as well as public-private partnerships and financing tools to pay for the infrastructure bill.

AASHTO's Victoria Sheehan said, "Financing mechanisms can supplement, but not replace direct federal funding." To pay for surface transportation reauthorization, Sheehan noted AASHTO's endorsement of motor fuel tax increase and indexing; freight-based user fee; per barrel oil fee; and mileage-based user fee or vehicle miles traveled.

Senator Stabenow (D-MI) noted that EVs are only 2% of vehicles sold today, and a fee on EVs would only cover 1.6% of the Highway Trust Fund (HTF) shortfall. Senator Stabenow said that fees on EVs are not a solution over the next five-years, at least, and to make sure "large corporate users of roads and highways are paying their fair share."

Senator Brown, Chairman of the Senate Banking Committee, asked NACo about what Congress can do to make public transit and housing investments work together. Buch noted that housing can be paired with transit by pursuing transit-oriented development with housing agencies, as well as partnership outreach to local financial institutions to support home conversions and additional housing units.

Senator Warner (D-VA) discussed the Reinventing Economic Partnerships and Infrastructure Redevelopment Act (REPAIR) Act which would "establish a fiscally responsible Infrastructure Financing Authority to complement existing infrastructure funding through loans and loan guarantees."

Senator Cornyn (R-TX) discussed imposing a mileage-based fee on heavy trucks to help raise money for the HTF but said that a corporate tax increase or gas tax increase are "nonstarters."

Senator Cantwell (D-WA), Chair of the Senate Commerce Committee, discussed the issue of sustainable funding for the HTF - noting support of the Chamber of Commerce and others on increased user fees. Buch mentioned that counties are concerned about the insolvency of the HTF and encouraged Congress to find a sustainable funding source.

U.S. DOT Personnel

Nuria Fernandez was confirmed by the Senate to serve as the Federal Transit Administrator.



GOVERNOR'S HIGHLIGHTS:

New Laws: Governor Pritzker signed the Budget implementation Act -- <u>SB 2017</u> (Harmon/Harris) which includes the statutory language necessary to implement the budget.

Governor Pritzker signed <u>HB 3922</u> (Ford/Lightford) which designates Juneteenth as an official state holiday. The Governor's press release is <u>here.</u> In honor of Juneteenth, Governor Pritzker closed all state offices on Friday, June 18th.

Governor Pritzker also signed the omnibus election bill, <u>SB 825</u> (Harmon/West). The bill makes several changes including moving the primary election to June 28, 2022. Other key provisions in the bill include:

- Setting petition circulation to begin January 13.
- Establishing the petition filing period to be March 7 14
- Directing that vote by mail ballots be available beginning March 30, with early voting to begin May 19.
- Making curbside voting permanent
- Allowing voters to be put on a list of individuals who wish to permanently vote by mail.
- Changing the process to fill a legislative vacancy so as to make the process more open to the public.
- Allowing county sheriffs to set up ballot booths at county jails.
- Creating a pilot program to allow election authorities to establish at least one location for anyone in the county or municipality to vote on election day.
- Establishing a process to allow the appointment of transgender persons to the Democratic State Central Committee
- Permitting elected officials to use campaign funds for vehicle-related expenditures, provided they are for primarily campaign of governmental duties.
- Preventing units of local government from adopting measures that require General
 Assembly members to resign their offices in order to be eligible to win an office in the
 unit of local government.

Executive Orders: Executive Order 2021-13 extends the moratorium on evictions.

<u>Executive Order 2021-12</u> enacts Phase 5 of the Governor's restore Illinois plan which transitions to a reopening in Illinois.

Deputy Governor: Andy Manar will replace Dan Hynes as Deputy Governor for Budget and Economy.

COVID Update: With new COVID infections continuing to decrease, the Illinois Department of Public Health announced it will now offer detailed COVID data every Friday instead of releasing data daily. Illinois' case positivity rate remains below 1%.

Governor Pritzker announced a new \$10 million 'All In for the Win' promotion that will reward vaccinated Illinoisans by automatically entering them into a series of cash and scholarship lotteries with prizes up to \$1 million. All In for the Win offers \$7 million in cash prizes to vaccinated adults, ranging from \$100,000 to \$1 million, and \$3 million in scholarship awards to vaccinated youth, held in Bright Start 529 College Savings Plan. Residents who received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine in Illinois are automatically entered into the lotteries. After each draw, IDPH will reach out to the winners to ask for authorization to share their name and contact information with the Illinois Lottery.

ILLINOIS GENERAL ASSEMBLY:

The Illinois General Assembly reconvened this week in a special session. The Senate was in session on Tuesday; the House was in session on Wednesday. The Senate adjourned to the call of the President. The House adjourned to the call of the Speaker. Both chambers could return to session if and when a deal is reached on omnibus clean energy legislation.

Faced with the challenge of getting members back to Springfield for a one-day session, the House made a temporary rule change to allow for remote voting for items pending before the full House. The Senate changed its operating rules to allow for remote voting in January.

Both chambers reconvened primarily to consider clean energy legislation -- although an omnibus energy bill was not actually considered this week in either chamber. While an agreement appeared on track last week, it was sidelined as session grew near. Senator Cunningham testified before the Senate Energy and Public Utilities Committee that there is currently an agreement on a wide number of items including subsidies for Exelon; a new rate making system; the state's investment in renewable energy (including equity provisions and labor standards); and ethics provisions. At present, there are two competing draft proposals -- one supported by the Governor and the environmental community, and another supported by the labor community. At this time, the work of the legislative working group has stalled as a result of this impasse.

While energy legislation was off the table this week, the General Assembly did approve a handful of other items. Most importantly, both chambers approved clean up language to address drafting errors with the effective date provisions of the budget bill passed at the end of session. The Governor issued an amendatory veto to the budget bill <u>SB 2800</u> (Harmon/Welch) to fix the drafting errors. The House and Senate approved the amendatory veto, thus allowing to take effect as intended the provisions of the operating budget, capital budget, and FY 21 supplemental.

The House concurred with the Senate's amendments to <u>HB 562</u> (Hoffman/Koehler). The measure is an initiative of the Illinois State Police designed to modernize the FOID card process, make reforms to address the backlog in FOID and concealed card processing, and address perceived "loopholes" regarding the transfer of firearms. The bill does not include mandatory fingerprinting, but individuals who submit to voluntary fingerprinting will have the ability to get a non-expiring FOID card. HB 562 now heads to the Governor's desk.

Both chambers approved <u>HB 1738</u> (Walsh/Hastings) which is a telecommunication sunset correction. The bill, as amended, fixes a drafting error in the telecom bill regarding the continuation of the Small Wireless Facilities Deployment Act. HB 1738 now heads to the Governor's desk.

The Illinois House concurred with the Senate's amendments to HB 1092 (Wang Stoneback/Gillespie). As amended, the bill makes changes to the Firearms Restraining Order (FRO), not only directing the Illinois Department of Public Health to promote public awareness of the FRO but also: creating a Commission on Implementing the FRO Act; requiring the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board to create and conduct an officer training on the FRO; clarifying which family members can request a FRO; and identifying the jurisdiction in which a petition for a FRO can be filed. HB 1092 now heads to the Governor's desk.

The Illinois House approved a bill, <u>HB 2908</u> (Ramirez/Martwick), to provide for a transition to a fully elected 21-member Chicago School Board by the year 2026. Representative Ramirez noted she will be filing a trailer bill to address outstanding issues. She also filed a motion to reconsider the vote shortly after the bill's passage -- placing a procedural hold on the bill. Once that motion is removed, the bill will head to the Governor's desk.

The House approved <u>HB 2643</u> (Hoffman/Holmes), as amended, which represents an agreement by business and labor groups along with IDES, to fix the state's unemployment system. The bill rolls five provisions into one bill. Note that the bill makes several administrative changes to IDES including allowing IDES to talk with legislative offices and requiring IDES to report certain information to the Illinois Department of Revenue with respect to fraudulent claims. The bill also temporarily extends benefits to certain non-instructional educational staff until such time as federal benefits end.

Tiffany Moy is the new Chief of Staff for the Office of the Speaker. Moy has served as the Issues Development Director since January and was the unit's Deputy Director prior to that.

SUBJECT: Recommendation to Award Contract for Improvements of Fifty-One (51)

Bloomington Bus Stops / FY 2021 - Better Bus Stops Campaign

Recommendation:

Authorize the Interim General Manager to award a contract to JG Stewart for construction of fifty-one (51) bus stop improvements in the Better Bus Stops Campaign. These improvements include installation of concrete pads for eighteen (18) Simme-Seat benches.

Background:

Connect Transit's Better Bus Stops Campaign has a goal to improve all existing bus stops by 2024. Connect Transit's efforts have improved over one-hundred bus stops throughout the City of Bloomington and the Town of Normal thus far. Connect Transit is currently in the process of designing over 100 bus stop improvements that will be planned for construction in the fall of 2021 and the spring of 2022.

Discussion:

On May 20, 2021, Connect Transit released an Invitation for Bid for the construction of fifty-one (51) bus stop improvements. Three (3) bids were received from JG Stewart, Knapp Concrete and Stark Excavating. JG Stewart provided the lowest bid for these services as detailed in the summary table below. JG Stewart has a long-standing history in Bloomington-Normal and has completed many other similar projects in our communities as well as previous bus stop improvement projects for Connect Transit.

Financial Impact:

The cost for construction of the fifty-one (51) proposed bus stop improvements in the City of Bloomington will be \$206,090. Funding for these improvements will be made available by the IDOT Rebuild Illinois Capital Grant and IDOT DOAP Debt Service.
